How have Christmas traditions changed since Victorian times?







Christmas traditions today include giving and receiving gifts, decorating our houses with a tree and lights, writing to or visiting Father Christmas, sending cards.

Queen Victoria was Queen of England from 1837 – 1901. During her reign, many traditions of Christmas were introduced which we still use to day to celebrate Christmas.

Before Queen Victoria, nobody in Britain had heard of Father Christmas or Christmas crackers. No cards were sent and most people did not have holidays from work.

The first Christmas card was created in 1843.

The Christmas tree was introduced to England by Queen Victoria's husband, Prince Albert. Decorations were home made and include snowflakes, tinsel, candles and an angel on top of the tree.

The Christmas cracker was invented in 1848 by Tom Smith, they were created as a way to sell sweets.

Christmas puddings were home made.

In Victorian times most gifts were homemade so only the wealthy could afford them. In a poor child's stocking there would usually be an apple, an orange and a few nuts.
